- (d) number of addiction and substance use disorder providers who have received direct grant payments.

Attachment A

Provider Fiscal and Programmatic Stabilization:

Stabilization initiatives will assist providers with fiscal recovery and enable them to continue
offering COVID-safe substance use disorder prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and
recovery services. These initiatives will offer financial assistance to addiction services providers
to resume programs interrupted by the pandemic and sustain or enhance existing programs and
services.

Workforce Development, including Training, Technical Assistance and Recruitment and Retention Incentives:

To attract and retain quality staff, the Workforce initiatives will invest in incentives for staff
incentives to recruit, retain and strengthen workforce in eligible programs, such as hiring
payments and/or retention incentives, education, and training,

Primary Prevention Support and Activities:

 Initiatives will strengthen and support existing prevention programming through training, purchasing materials to assist in evidence-based programming and prevention strategies, and fostering workforce development though internships, leadership academies, and collaboration with colleges. OASAS also seeks to expand awareness and impact through media campaigns and use of mobile technology and establishing more local coalitions to facilitate partnerships and linkages to reach more people more effectively.

Recovery, including Recovery Community Centers, Youth Clubhouses, and Peer Engagement:

 OASAS continues to strengthen and expand our existing recovery community services, such as Recovery Community Centers and Youth Clubhouses, as well as support of an Alumni Association and Youth Voices Matter, a youth recovery community organization toolkit.

Information Technology Infrastructure, including purchase of equipment, expansion of Telehealth, implementation, and upgrades to Electronic Health Records systems:

These initiatives will provide funding to purchase equipment, software, and other technology to
establish the necessary infrastructure to deliver SUD telehealth services and other technology
upgrades in data collection and reporting tools to improve the ability to measure outcomes,
collect data relevant to evolving practices and improve service delivery based on real-time
information.

Treatment, including funding to support conversion costs of comprehensive outpatient programs, and SBIRT screening/intervention programs:

- To increase access to opioid treatment, grant funds are supporting the expansion of outpatient clinics to offer medication for addiction treatment and to purchase and outfit mobile medication units to bring services where they are needed.
- Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) is a comprehensive public health approach to identify those at risk of developing substance use disorders and delivers

early intervention and treatment services to individuals whose exhibit hab, its of risky use of alcohol and other substances

Outreach, including Transportation initiatives to engage patients and make treatment more accessible:

 Program outreach to individuals not connected to care will support harm reduction and provide in-community support services and engagement. This includes care coordination and the provision of transportation assistance to ensure access to treatment, recovery, and other basic services.

Transitional Housing and support for Residential Reintegration programs:

- Transition housing will help provide short-term transitional housing and case management for individuals leaving OASAS residential treatment or correctional facilities who cannot otherwise access permanent housing.
- The conversion of current Community Residences to Part 820 Residential Reintegration programs requires additional staffing resource. This initiative will provide one-time financial assistance to programs that are converting to the higher level of care, which may then bill Medicaid and Medicaid Managed Care.

Testing resources for SUD treatment program staff and clients:

This initiative provides testing resources for SUD treatment program staff; provides testing
resources for clients receiving SUD treatment services; and other related and ancillary COVID19 mitigation services as necessary and appropriate to keep the addiction treatment
environment safer.

Temporary staff to assist in the administration of the funds, including contract development and payments

 To assist in managing these initiatives, OASAS has hired temporary staff to augment and support current OASAS staff for the development of procurements and resulting contracts, purchasing activities, processing payments, tracking expenditures, program implementation, and development and submission of required reporting.
