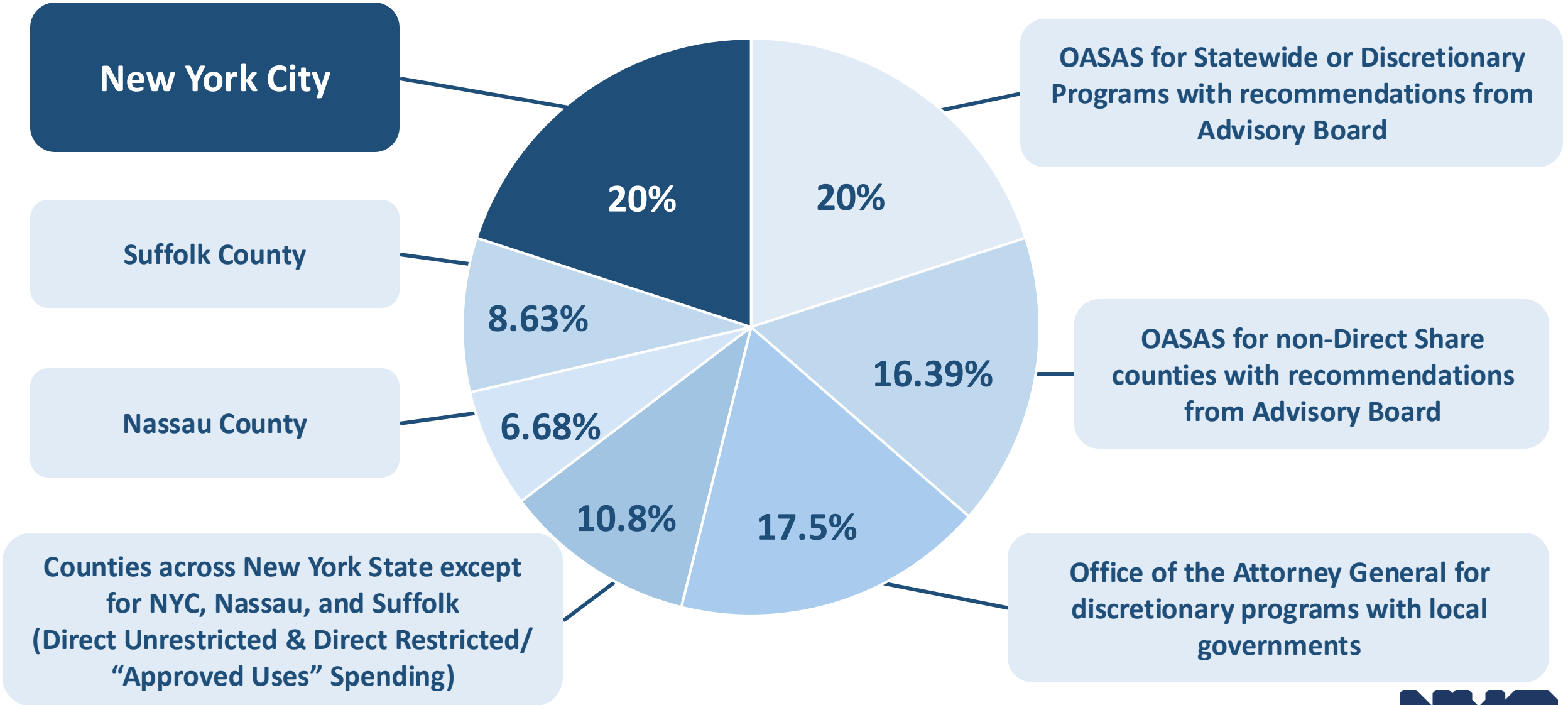

NYC OSF Initiatives Funded in FY23

NYC Health Department

Expansion of wrap-around services and hours at existing syringe service programs (SSPs) that operate **Overdose Prevention Centers (OPCs)** to strengthen care connections and increase hours

Health + Hospitals

Expansion of capacity, scope, and coverage for teams of social workers and counselors engaging ED patients who may be at risk for substance use disorder in and beyond the medical ED
(Treatment and Outreach)

Office of Chief Medical Examiner (OCME)

The Drug Intelligence and Intervention Group (DIIG) served New Yorkers who had lost a loved one to drug overdose by addressing material and socioemotional needs

Outcomes from NYC Health Department

In FY24 (June 2023 – June 2024), OnPoint NYC provided:

Harm Reduction Services

Participants

Services include provision of naloxone, health education, buprenorphine prescription, rapid HCV tests, and referrals to outside organizations for care.

Services addressing basic needs including respite, meals, laundry, bathroom/shower use in Drop-In Centers

Outcomes from NYC Health + Hospitals ED Leads

In FY24 (June 2023 – June 2024), ED Leads provided:

24,317

Encounters

Services include SUD screening, brief intervention and referral to treatment (SBIRT), individual counseling, peer support, naloxone education and kit distribution, fentanyl and Xylazine test strips.

Outcomes from NYC Health + Hospitals CATCH

In FY24 (June 2023 – June 2024), CATCH provided:

8,269

Encounters

CATCH (Consult for Addiction Treatment and Care in Hospital)

Services include expert evaluation, diagnosis and treatment of patients with SUD/ODU hospitalized for any condition, withdrawal management support, medication-assisted treatment, individual counseling, peer support, SUD bridging.

Outcomes from NYC Health + Hospitals Virtual ExpressCare

In FY24 (June 2023 – June 2024), Virtual ExpressCare provided:

542

Visits from Patients with SUD

Services include brief intervention counseling, crisis intervention, bridging medication management (including MAT), referral to ongoing behavioral health care, and treatment for urgent conditions.

32

Buprenorphine Prescriptions

Outcomes from OCME DIIG Program

In FY24 (June 2023 – June 2024), DIIG provided:

1,300

Engagements with individuals following the loss of their loved one to overdose.

Direct support and referrals include long- and short-term mental health care, financial support services, harm-reduction and substance use treatment, housing support programs, and immigration services.

NYC Recently Announced Funding Ramp Up

NYC will apply **\$50 million** in annual funding by FY27 to build on previously mentioned programming.

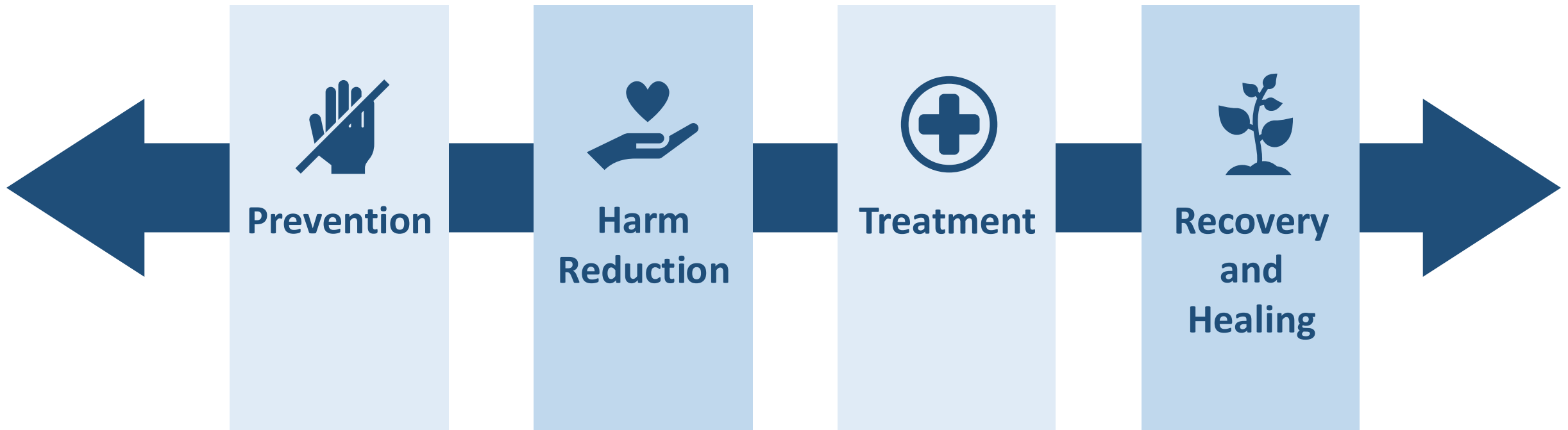
